Redlands embarks on Wastewater Treatment Plant rehabilitation

The City Council recently approved an agreement for design services with Parsons Water & Infrastructure Inc., an engineering design firm located in Pasadena, to perform an assessment of the City's existing Wastewater Treatment Plant and prepare an implementation plan for immediate and long term plant improvements.

The Wastewater Treatment Plant, originally built in 1962, treats an average of 5.5 million gallons of wastewater daily. It has had numerous upgrades over the last 50 years and much of the existing infrastructure has exhausted its useful life and requires rehabilitation to continue the treatment operations.

Parsons is a nationally recognized design firm with extensive experience in wastewater treatment plant design and operations.



Upon completion of a field assessment of the plant, design will begin and will be completed in 12 months. The City intends to conduct an independent peer review in order to ensure an efficient and effective design, providing best value for the customers.



In addition, attendees enjoyed live music, open skating, scootering and beginner clinics, a bounce house and outdoor activities for all ages. Following review and recommendation by the Parks and Recreation Commission, on April 17, 2018, the City Council awarded a contract to Three Peaks Corp. for construction of the Redlands Skatepark in Sylvan Park, west of the Redlands Lawn Bowling Club. The completed project cost approximately \$1.1 million, which included funds earmarked from the City's sale of the Nevada Palmetto Groves and \$127,000 in private donations raised by two community groups, Friends of Redlands Skatepark and SK8 Park.

City staff and design representatives held three public workshops, attended by approximately 250 people, to solicit design input and sought additional input through social media. The park consists of a 15,000-square-foot, in-ground skate park, with both street and bowl type skating and landscaping amenities.

ly stood up at the dinner table and signaled to his crew that he was in trouble. Firefighter/Paramedic Richard Hurtado and Engineer Brad Byers jumped into action and began to assess what needed to be done to help Captain Davis. Once Engineer Byers confirmed Captain Davis was choking he removed his jacket while Firefighter/Paramedic Hurtado began to perform the Heimlich maneuver. Engineer Byers then ran to the truck to retrieve Advanced Life Support gear in case the obstruction could not be cleared with the Heimlich maneuver After three Firefighter/Paramedic attempts, Hurtado succeeded in dislodging the obstruction with the Heimlich maneuver. Captain Davis and all of the Redlands Fire Department are extremely grateful for the actions taken by Firefighter/Paramedic Richard Hurtado and Engineer Byers to save Captain Davis' life.
